


Middletown Township Historical Society: October Happenings

"Sandy Hook's Lost Highland Beach Resort"
presented by Susan Sandlass Gardiner

The Middletown Township Historical Society hosts Susan Sandlass Gardiner as she presents on her upcoming book, "Sandy Hook's Lost Highland Beach Resort." Built by William Sandlass during the Golden Age of the Jersey Shore, the Highland Beach resort was an iconic landmark for more than seven decades. Tourists were brought by trains, ferries, and automobiles to enjoy the sun, surf, and plentiful amusements. Meet the characters who shaped this part of Middletown who had the vision for a storied resort, now wiped away by time, technology, and politics.

Susan Gardiner, granddaughter of William Sandlass, is a co-founder of the Jersey Coast Heritage Museum established in 2016. The non-profit strives to create awareness of the history of Highland Beach resort as a vital legacy of the Jersey Shore. Susan grew up in Sea Bright, New Jersey and moved to Washington, D.C. in 1965. For over twenty-five years she was active in Bilingual Community and Media Relations in the Montgomery County Public School System. As a community activist, she was awarded the Distinguished Service to Public Education by Montgomery County Board of Education in 2014. Her award-winning photography and experience as a documentarian continue to enrich her pursuits. She lives with her husband Gary in Montgomery Village, Maryland.

As always, the event is free to attend, but it does require registration. After you complete the brief <u>registration form</u>, you will receive an email that includes a link to the virtual event. Just click that link a few minutes before 7:00 pm, enter the Password that will also be provided within your registration email, and you'll be welcomed into our event! Yearbook Digitization Grant Awarded


Thanks to a \$500 grant from the Investors Bank Foundation, we will soon be able to have a number of Middletown Township High School yearbooks ("Odranoel") scanned and indexed. We will be concentrating on pre-1960 yearbooks for this phase, and will scan as many as we are able to afford. We hope that the yearbooks will be available on our website by spring of 2021!



Oceanic Bridge Project

The Oceanic Bridge that connects Middletown's historic Locust neighborhood to Rumson is slated to be substantially rehabilitated or replaced. The current bridge is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places and was constructed in 1939, replacing one that was built in 1891. After considering alternatives, the county has proposed a new, non-movable bridge with a 65' clearance over the high tide (compared to today's 22' clearance). The county is

soliciting public comments until October 16. If you would like to review the details (which includes videos that show the height and scale of the new bridge compared to today's) and have your voice heard, visit the <u>project website</u>.
