Take A Tour Through Historic Middletown Village with this Film from 1964

The Middletown Township Historical Society is pleased to present a refreshed version of "Roadside Story: Middletown Village Along the King's Highway." This color film was created by the Middletown Camera Club for the town's Tercentenary celebration in 1964. The narrated tour takes you outside and inside some of the most interesting buildings in the Village, including the Franklin Academy, Hartshorne House, Marlpit Hall, Taylor-Butler House

(Orchard Home), and more. It runs for nearly 25 minutes and is a treat for those wanting to see the interiors of these historic buildings. [Watch now](#) to experience it, and view how the area looked over 50 years ago.


The film played at local events through the 1970s, but was then largely unseen until the Middletown Township Landmarks Commission had it transferred to DVD for the town's 350 celebration in 2014. This year, MTHS has digitally transferred it, reordered and edited some scenes, and added a revised narration that keeps to the spirit of the original. Proposal for Long-Term Housing at Fort Hancock

The National Park Service has received a proposal from a New York City developer to rehabilitate about 20 buildings, including houses on Officer's Row, into around 90 rental apartments. Last month, NPS held an online information session about this proposal and the current state of leasing at Fort Hancock. 


